## Trail Development Committee and what we do:

### Trail Development Committee

What is a Travel Management Plan? It is a group of choices a United States National Forest official makes concerning the roads and trails that will be available for use by the public in a specific forest. What happens when the choices are contrary to the public's habits as they have utilized that forests? Depending on whether or not the public have been making comments during the scoping period for the forest will depend on if anything can be done. Appeals are the next step. Your Trail Development Committee has made two appeals in the past. The trail DC4W worked on this summer is a result of a forest

official listening to the *appeal process*. The Travel Management Plans go through a scoping period. That is the period of time when we *ask all of you to comment on how you frequent the forests*. DC4W's Trail Development Committee go farther than Deschutes National Forest. We have submitted input into forests from Wallow Whitman to Willamette. The Steens Mountains to the beaches and dunes on our west coast. We have promise of hundreds miles of trails and areas to build and to maintain as class II use areas. Are you up to it? If you aren't, who then will be? 4-wheeling should just be a ride in the country. But, like everything else, it has to be worth it. **Keep Access.**
